


Tomatoes

(Indeterminate) <i>[The original Abraham Lincoln was a late-maturing variety introduced about 1923. This early season selection (circa 1975) ripens 10-12 days earlier, has smaller fruit, and does not have the bronze-green foliage characteristic of the original.]</i> Flavor is slightly acidic and distinctive. Plants have excellent resistance to foliage disease - highly recommended where foliage disease is a problem.  A photograph showing a cluster of small, round, dark red tomatoes with green stems, growing on a vine.	<p>Black Cherry - Plentiful clusters of juicy-sweet deep-red tomatoes with a blackish hue. An heirloom too rarely encountered, this delectable variety fully merits a place in the garden and on the dinner table. Yields plentiful clusters of perfectly round 1" true cherry tomatoes that are deep red with a blackish hue. The flavor is complex, rich, juicy and sweet. Stunning “Blushed” in red and gold combine with a translucent quality to give these elongated cherries serious visual appeal! The fruits, similar in size and shape to large olives, score high in taste tests. Blush was selected by eight-year-old Alex Hempel from two of his favorite tomatoes, and is an ancestor of the Bumble Bee series! Outstanding!</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.rareseeds.com .)</p>



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	<p>Brandywine Pink - HEIRLOOM. Dating back to 1885, this heirloom wins most flavor contests. Brandywine, which dates back to 1885, is the heirloom tomato standard. One taste and you'll be enchanted by its superb flavor and luscious shade of red-pink. The large, beefsteak-shaped fruits grow on unusually upright, potato-leaved plants. The fruits set one or two per cluster and ripen late-and are worth the wait. Brandywine's qualities really shine when it develops an incredible fine, sweet flavor. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Brandy Boy – Flavor of Brandywine with more shapely form, tidier growth, improved disease resistance and bigger earlier yields. Large pink fruits up to 5 ½ inches across. Indeterminate. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Bush Big Boy Hybrid - Our classic Big Boy has been made better, especially for small-space gardeners. A better Big Boy? You get the same number of tasty, big red tomatoes (10 to 11 oz. each) with the same sweet, aromatic, melt-in-your-mouth juiciness as the original. But the compact plants are only half the size! Disease-resistant, easy to grow and ideal for short stakes, cages and tubs. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Celebrity Hybrid - All America Selections winner! Heavy yields of tasty tomatoes. All-purpose variety with superb flavor, disease resistance and heavy yield on determinate plants. Crack-resistant fruits average 7 oz. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Cherokee Purple - HEIRLOOM. Its flavor is rich and full—often compared with Brandywine. This large dark purple heirloom tomato from Tennessee is rumored to have come from Cherokee gardeners. With its rich, full flavor, it's often compared with Brandywine. The flesh is brick-red and very attractive sliced on a plate. Plants produce large vines that yield tomatoes fully 5" across and 3 1/2" deep. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>

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	<p>Dr. Carolyn Tomato - 63 days. (Indeterminate) <i>[Selected from a sport of Galinas. Named by Steve Draper in honor of Dr. Carolyn Male who first saved the seed.]</i> The most flavorful yellow cherry tomato we've grown. Excellent balance of sugar, tartness and depth of flavor. Pale yellow, round, 1¼ in. fruits typically borne 6 to a cluster. Large, vigorous vines provide excellent cover.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>
	<p>Juliet Hybrid - Looks like a miniature Italian plum tomato, but it's really a cherry—juicy and sweet. This All-America Selections winner plum of a cherry is juicy and sweet and packed with flavor. Big vines produce grape-like clusters of petite sweeties. Best of all, it's the most crack resistant cherry tomato ever.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Lizzano Hybrid - All-America Selections winner. Compact plants are ideal for containers, baskets and small gardens. This cherry tomato with its compact dwarf habit offers a prolonged, nonstop harvest of delectable round 1" fruits—just right for snacks, dips and salads. The plants of this AAS 2011 winner grow just 16-20" tall and 20" wide, prime candidates for containers, baskets and sunbathing on the patio. Lizzano's resistance to late blight allows it to keep turning out oodles of cherries when other tomatoes have retired for the season. Semi-determinate.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Mortgage Lifter - HEIRLOOM. Legendary, huge beefsteak consistently wins taste-tests. This huge heirloom beefsteak (up to 4 lb.; average 2 1/2 lb.) consistently wins taste-tests. Developed in the 1930s by a gardener who planted the four biggest varieties he knew and crossed one with pollen from the other three. He did this for six seasons and created a variety that produced immense, tasty fruit. He sold the plants for \$1 a piece and paid off his \$6000 mortgage in 6 years.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Mountain Princess - 68 days. (Determinate) <i>[Heirloom from the Monongahela National Forest Region of WV]</i> Very early and productive. 4-6 oz red fruit is round, smooth, and solid, a good choice for early season farmers markets. Best in cool, short-season areas.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>
	<p>Old Virginia – 80 days. (Indeterminate) <i>[Heirloom from the Giltner family.]</i> Old-time sweet/tart tomato taste. 4-7 oz., dark red, smooth, round fruits with few seeds. The 5-6 ft. tall plants produce even in long hot summers. Good yields and flavor make this a keeper.</p> <p>(Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>

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	<p>OTV Brandywine Tomato - 72 days. (Indeterminate) <i>[Named and released by Dr. Carolyn Male and Craig LeHoullier, editors of Off the Vine (OTV), heirloom tomato newsletter. Bred from an accidental cross of Yellow Brandywine and an unknown red beefsteak.]</i> One of the best Brandywine strains. Smooth, creamy, almost buttery texture, and harmonious sweet flavor. Fruits are a rich red color with an orange undertone. Produces a large percentage of usable attractive tomatoes, relatively free of defects, averaging 12 oz. Excellent potato leaf foliage cover. 6-8 ft. tall plants. The most productive and heat-tolerant Brandywine. A must for every tomato lover. (Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>
	<p>Ozark Pink – Bears 7 oz flattened-globe shaped fruits. Excellent eating quality and shelf life. Recommended for hot, humid, disease-prone areas. Indeterminate. (Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>
	<p>Roma VF, Virginia Select Paste - 75 days. (Determinate) <i>[Introduced 2009 by SESE.]</i> Neighboring farmer and Growing for Market writer Pam Dawling has been saving this locally adapted strain since 2001, selecting for high, early yields and tolerance to Septoria Leaf Spot. (Seeds available at www.southernexposure.com)</p>
	<p>Sun Gold Hybrid - Rapidly becoming the most popular cherry tomato of all time. One taste and you'll know why this gold gem gets such high marks. The sweet-tart flavor is simply amazing. The beautiful golden-orange fruits are borne in large clusters. The flavor develops early, so this little tomato is great for snacking a week before full maturity, when it becomes very sweet and delicious. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>
	<p>Super Sweet 100 Hybrid - Scarlet, cherry-sized tomatoes produce long clusters right up to frost. Cherry tomatoes bursting with sugary flavor. The scarlet, cherry-sized fruits are produced in long pendulous clusters right up to frost. Grow on stakes or a fence. (Seeds available at www.burpee.com)</p>

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Super Beefsteak - Better than Beefsteak! Delicious, flavorful, meaty fruits have smooth shoulders, not as rough and ridgy as Beefsteak and the blossom end scars are smaller. Prolific, vigorous plants produce luscious red fruits averaging 17 oz.
