Horticulture Learning Center - Bob Durbin and Holly Owens (reporting) -

Irrigation

- The HLC Coordinators along with input from the Extension Staff, VCAP Staff and Board
 Officers have decided that we will not submit the VCAP Application for funding the
 irrigation project. After submitting water harvest calculations we were informed that the
 amount we are eligible for would not be sufficient to complete the project according to the
 plan.
- Rainwater Harvest Systems in Roanoke has all of the materials and equipment for the water tank. They have everything needed to install a tank and will provide expertise if needed.
- Funding for the system will be provided using the Rappahannock Grant, the Keep Virginia Beautiful Grant, proceeds from the Ashland Harvest Run and the HLC funds on hand.
- Boy Scouts are asking to help with a project and may be able to assist with installing the piping in the garden.

After a complete interview of the homeowner and plant material, recommendations were made for soil testing, fertilization, mulching, proper pruning, relocating shrubs, and choosing new plant material. Several VT publications were furnished to address these issues.

Visit for Scotchtown Caretaker Cottage

Date Visited: August 30, 2023

Master Gardeners Attended: Emily Gianfortoni, Linda Hazelwood, Doris Gullotta

Scotchtown is located on approximately 45 acres. A caretaker's cottage is located behind the main house. The present tenant, Laurel Scott, requested assistance with identifying invasive plants,

recommendations for maintenance of the planting beds around the house, and suggestions for historic and native plants that bloom in the summer and fall and require low maintenance.

Identification and removal recommendations were made for Chinese privet, Asiatic bittersweet, English ivy, and poison ivy. Recommendations were made for adding native perennials, and low maintenance herbs. The property's appearance would be enhanced with a general clean up and removal of selected trees.
