Horticulture Learning Center - Bob Durbin and Holly Owens -

Notes from the HLC Meeting 6/12/23

Attendees: Holly Owens, Katherine Herbert, Pat Reyes, Linda Hazelwood, Susan Warren, Lisa Willis, Susan Higgins, Laurel Hill, Wayne Bryant, Janice Thomas, Bob Durbin

The meeting began with everyone feeling excited about the progress of the HLC. All beds have been set up for planting and all but two beds have plants growing in them currently.

A brief review of the budget was discussed. Bob stated there was about \$5200 in cash and over \$6000 in in-kind donations given the HLC. A review of the grant status for REC, Lowes and KVB.

Holly, discussed the garden work schedule and entering information in BI. Holly also discussed a new procedure in the garden of completing an HLC daily record form which will record pertinent information on the status of the garden. Holly also mentioned the new storage area enclosed by fence panels, thanks to the efforts of Ed Hazelwood.

Bob stated we still have a commitment to accept a donated greenhouse which will need to be done in the next several weeks. Wayne thinks this donation will benefit the garden and Laurel stated she could have some young folks assist with the work of taking down and transporting the greenhouse.

The committee discussed adding more beds to the HLC. Bob mentioned that there are currently 19 beds in the garden. Wayne and Lisa suggested creating a pitcher plant bed in one of the small galvanized beds. The committee also discussed the importance of maintaining the garden and not overbuilding given their resources. In the end, the committee decided to add three more beds to HMGA, one of which would be a pitcher plant bed developed by Wayne and Lisa. The other two beds would be available for other master gardeners to develop.

Wayne and Holly talked about the meeting with county officials about the rain harvesting system. Eric Huff from the county suggested sticking with the roof plan and not pursuing the groundwater system that no one seems to comprehend. Bob mentioned that both grants that have been awarded have a completion date of November. The committee agreed to proceed with the tank pad and to reserve a tank at Tractor Supply.

The committee then turned their attention to the planting committee and entering plant ID information into the Google sheet Laurel had developed. Bob distributed several copies of soil tests that had been taken over the previous few weeks. A lengthy discussion was held about who would be responsible for adding soil amendments to the beds. It was decided that bed stewards would determine what amendments, if any, would be added to the beds. This could be done in collaboration with the HLC work crews. The HLC work crews would provide any disease and pest information to bed stewards to help them determine if any intervention would be necessary.

Holly reported that intern Ronni McCord had been working on bed steward tags and some plant identification tags for the beds. Everyone liked the idea of having different plant ID signs in the garden. Holly and Bob mentioned that a presentation on the HLC would be given at the picnic on the 17th. After the meeting, the three new garden beds were placed in the garden and Laurel added them to the garden grid format.

May 24 - Workday in all gardens

In the perennial gardens, primrose, butterfly weed, delphinium, nigella, tickseed and bell flowers are blooming. We marked the spent daffodils, so we know where to dig them up in the fall. We put tobacco plants in the fabric garden, added cotton and more hemp seeds.

For the kitchen garden, we cleaned out all the spring plants, many were going to seed. We planted seeds for the three sisters: corn, squash, and beans. We also added support poles for the beans. We planted seeds for black eyed peas and peanuts along with pepper and pumpkin plants. We removed more garlic chives and moved some lamb's ear. Two tomato plants were installed along with support poles.
